

A HISTORY OF THE KINDERTRANSPORT: MUSEUM-QUALITY EXHIBITION PANELS

In the months between the November 9, 1938 Kristallnacht ("Night of Broken Glass") pogrom and the start of World War II, a unique rescue operation now known as the Kindertransport brought nearly ten thousand unaccompanied children from Germany, Austria, and Czechoslovakia to safety in Great Britain. Most of the children, but not all, were Jews. Most of the parents who had sent them to safety perished in the Holocaust. Many of the children settled in Britain; others re-emigrated to Israel, the Americas, and elsewhere, scattering over the world.

The Kindertransport Association has created a series of exhibition panels that trace their epic journey from 1938 into the 21st century.

These panels are designed for exhibit in Holocaust Museums and Study Centers, Universities, Schools, and Jewish Community Centers. The full set of exhibition panels consists of 17 full color panels (16 are 30" x 40"; 1 is 20" x 30"), laminated and framed, sealed in non-glare plexiglass.
